Application Deadline February 13, 2020

Application Instructions: Please read **carefully** and follow **all** instructions:

1. If you are not currently a Galveston College student, you must apply for admission to Galveston College following the guidelines in the General Catalog. Along with the application to the College, submit Official Transcripts from all universities and colleges you have attended to the **Office of Admissions, 4015 Avenue Q. Galveston, Texas 77550.**

The Galveston College application is separate from the one required by the Associate Degree Nursing Program (ADN). Applicants will be considered for admission for the Nursing Department after students are admitted to Galveston College.

2. Submit the attached application for admission to the Department of Nursing in the Regents Hall of Galveston College by **February 13, 2020**. This application is formatted for download from the Nursing Department webpage and completion on your computer (except for your signature). Once completed, print, sign, and submit the application. Hard copy applications are also available from the Nursing Department.

The Transition application for admission will be evaluated on the following basis:

- **Grade point average of 2.5 or > for science courses:** BIOL 2401, 2402 and 2421. These courses must be within 5 years of program start.
 - **Grade point average of 2.5 or > for all prerequisite courses:** HPRS 1206 Essentials of Medical Terminology; ENGL 1301; RNSG 1215 Health Assessment; RNSG 1301 Pharmacology; and meet the Math requirement.
 - **Overall grade point average must be 2.7.**
 - Submit Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) scores by February 13th, 2020. Students must take the following sections: English, Math, Science and Reading. It is MANDATORY that the student score a 62% or higher overall to be eligible for the ADN Program. The TEAS test results must be within twelve months of admission.
3. Obtain a clear background check. Any ADN applicant who has been arrested or convicted of a crime, or treated for certain mental illnesses or chemical dependency (see inclusive list below) must petition the Texas Board of Nursing (TBON) for a Declaratory Order concerning their eligibility to take the licensure exam upon graduation from the program. A list of applicant names will be sent to the TBON. You will be sent instructions by the TBON to schedule an appointment for fingerprinting. Once your fingerprints and background check have been cleared you will receive a BLUE CARD from TBON. You

must bring this card to the Department of Nursing where a copy will be made and the original will be returned to you.

If you answer yes to any of the following questions you **MUST** do the Petition for Declaratory Order (https://www.bon.texas.gov/forms_declaratory_order.asp).

❖ FOR ANY CRIMINAL OFFENSE, INCLUDING THOSE PENDING APPEAL, HAVE YOU:

- Been arrested and have a pending criminal charge?
- Been convicted of a misdemeanor?
- Been convicted of a felony?
- Pled nolo contendere, no contest, or guilty?
- Received deferred adjudication?
- Been placed on community supervision or court-ordered probation, whether or not adjudicated guilty?
- Been sentenced to serve jail or prison time? Court ordered confinement?
- Been granted pre-trial diversion?
- Been arrested or have any pending criminal charges?
- Been cited or charged with any violation of the law?
- Been subject of a court-martial: Article 15 violation: or received any form of military judgment/punishment/action?
- Are you currently the target or subject of a grand jury or government agency investigation?
- Has ANY licensing authority refused to issue a license or ever revoked, annulled, canceled, accepted surrender of, suspended, placed on probation, refused to renew a professional license, certificate, or multi-state privilege held by you now or previously, or ever fined, censured, reprimanded or otherwise disciplined you?
- Within the past five (5) years have you been addicted to and/or treated for the use of alcohol or any other drug?
- Within the past five (5) years have you been diagnosed with, treated, or hospitalized for schizophrenia, and/or psychotic disorders, bipolar disorder, paranoid personality disorder, antisocial personality disorder, or borderline personality disorder which impaired or does impair your behavior, judgement, or ability to function in school or work?

The Petition for Declaratory Order may take several months, so begin work on this issue immediately if it applies to you. Once you receive the official letter of clearance from the Board of Nursing, you **MUST** bring the letter to the Nursing Department and we will make a copy for your permanent file and return the original to you.

STANDARDS FOR NURSING STUDENTS

Responsibilities and standards in nursing practice are determined by the Texas Board of Nursing, national accreditation guidelines, and clinical agencies. Additionally, as described in various clinical evaluation tools and course guidelines, students **MUST BE** able to provide safe patient care.

Technical Standards for Nursing Practice: Nursing is a practice discipline and successful completion of the nursing program requires that students demonstrate ability to effectively and safely perform several essential skills. ALL students are assessed in practice labs and clinical practicums throughout the program to confirm adherence to the technical standards, with or without accommodations.

Intellectual Requirements: Critical thinking is an important part of clinical judgment needed to provide safe patient care. Students must be able to measure, calculate, reason, and quickly analyze information in order to apply complex information in the classroom and clinical settings.

Gross and Fine Motor Requirements: Nursing students must be able to provide general care (including preparing medications and administering treatment and completing patient assessments). For example, students must be able to perform basic life support (CPR), function in an emergency situation, and have the ability (within reasonable limits) to assist a patient in moving, such as from the chair to the bed. Must be able to lift 50 pounds. Must be able to see marking on syringes to be able to administer medications. Must be able to hear blood pressure, heart, lungs and bowel sounds.

Observation Skills: Student nurses must be able to observe patients accurately to assess their condition and perceived signs of disease and response to treatments through physical examination, including visual images, auditory information (patient voice, heart tones, bowel sounds, and lung sounds), and palpable changes in certain organs and tissues.

Communication Requirements: Nursing students must be able to communicate effectively with patients, staff, physicians, and family members, verbally and in a written format. Students must be able to process and accurately convey information about the patient's status to faculty, staff, and other healthcare providers in a timely manner.

Social and Behavioral Requirements: Student nurses must possess sufficient mental and emotional health to exercise good judgment, promptly complete assessments, and function in what can be a physically and emotionally demanding dynamic environment. Nursing students must be able to demonstrate compassion, empathy, and concern for others while maintaining a mature, sensitive, and effective relationship with patients, families and other professionals
